Segment 1: The P-40 Warhawk - Flying Tigers Spirit

Enter now—the **1940 Curtiss P-40 Warhawk**, in its iconic **AVG paint scheme**, shark mouth snarling as it dives into view!
Though never formally a Marine aircraft, the Warhawk represents the can-do fighting spirit shared by Marines who would soon face the storm of war across the Pacific.”

Segment 2: The SNJ Trainer - Turtle Bay Legacy


“Next, from the palm-lined runways of **Espiritu Santo** in the New Hebrides, emerges a humble hero—the **1943 SNJ** trainer.
Painted in **MAG-11 Turtle Bay colors**, this aircraft trained young men fresh from the States, preparing them for the crucible of combat.
Every Marine pilot began somewhere—and for many, it was in the cockpit of a warbird like this.”

Segment 3: The F4U Corsair - Pacific Powerhouse


“Now—listen to the thunder. The bent-wing bird of prey arrives.
The **F4U-1 Corsair**, painted in its **original Pacific Theater livery**, ruled the skies from Guadalcanal to Okinawa. With its distinctive gull-wing design and roaring Pratt & Whitney engine, the Corsair was the scourge of enemy pilots and a guardian angel for Marines on the ground.
Flown by Marine legends like Pappy Boyington and the Black Sheep of VMF-214, the Corsair is more than an aircraft—it's a symbol of relentless American resolve.”

Segment 4: SNJ “War Dog” - Stateside and Beyond



“Back home, training never stopped. Here comes the **SNJ ‘War Dog’**, in its **MCAS El Toro paint scheme**—a nod to the California base where thousands of Marine aviators earned their wings.

While others deployed, these aircraft ensured the pipeline of pilots stayed strong—ready to fight, ready to fly.”

Segment 5: The PBJ-1J “Semper Fi” - The Marine B-25



“Now, hear the deep growl of twin radial engines—it’s the **PBJ-1J ‘Semper Fi’**, the only flying **Marine Corps B-25** bomber in the world today.

Bearing the **Eagle, Globe, and Anchor**, this aircraft flew dangerous low-level strikes against Japanese shipping and coastal targets.

While the Army had the Mitchell, the **PBJ** gave Marine aircrews teeth in the skies above the Pacific.”

Segment 6: The AD-4N Skyraider - Cold War Warrior



“The war ended, but Marines continued to stand the watch.

Now entering the arena is the **AD-4N Skyraider**, wearing the proud colors of **VMC-1**.

This rugged, piston-powered attacker flew during the Korean War and into Vietnam, jamming enemy radar, covering Marines in the field, and delivering punishing payloads when jets couldn’t.

It earned the nickname ‘**Spad**’—and a reputation for unshakable durability.”

Segment 7: T-34B Mentor - Forging Future Pilots



“All great warriors begin as students.

Here comes the **T-34B Mentor**, painted in tribute to **VMFAT-101**—the legendary ‘Sharpshooters’ of Marine Corps pilot training.

From El Toro to Miramar, the T-34 shaped generations of Marine aviators, ensuring the Corps’ future was always in capable hands.”

Segment 8: OV-10 Bronco - Eyes of the Corps



“And finally, from the dense jungles of Southeast Asia, the **OV-10 Bronco** cuts through the sky.

Designed for forward air control, reconnaissance, and close air support, the Bronco was a **Marine pilot’s Swiss Army knife** during the Vietnam War.

Fast, agile, and versatile—it brought Marine air power closer to the ground troops than ever before.”
